



1. We started by asking ourselves how can we make braided shapes in the space. replacing the soul of the braid with a cherished object. We got inspired by the pyramid shape seen in an article that talks about mathematics and kumihimo. After a lot of thinking and several attempts the triaxal weaving seemed like a good solution to build up a 3D shape.

We thought next about making a wood loom in an octagone shape to better clip the ends to the wood. Using the triaxal weaving technique we made the pyramid sewing pattern in order to build the 3D shape.

2. We used some thread to keep the shape of the perimeter of the sewing triangle pattern in place. And used the leftover strands from the sides to create 4 hollow braids (light green, yellow, orange and pink) using the kumihimo technique and extending outwards the shape in an organic way. It keeps on growing.

Reminder: these strands need to be multiples of 4.

3. In order to develop our own 3D over size scapular shape, we started spontaniously braiding together, sharing the same kumihimo loom, knotting extra flat strands at the end to make the structure grow.

We soon noticed we would have to build some kind of stable, rotating device in order to make the collaborative kumihimo easier.

Observation: The new born shape reveiled an organic character. It felt like it had a life of its own, seeking to be further developped in order to reviel it's own shape. This thing is kind of becoming a being with its four starting limbs.

" It evoques an african mask, ritual costume vibe." "The colors and shape remind me of an avocado." "It looks like a heart with vessels."

There is an animistic connotation about it based on the physical characteristics (fluidity/rigidity) of the material.

- 4. Hereby the materials used to create the rotating kumihimo table.

 *Observation: Would it be useful to see the progression of the braiding if the tube was translucent?
- 5. Try out of the kumihimo table.

Observation: We used the technique in which the strands were chasing each other.

It felt like a game table.

Black chases black, replacing each other, clock wise. White chases white, replacing each other, anti clock wise.

6. Observation: This craft transmission tool can double itself into a small coffee table with a nice detail that reminds of the lace placed in the middle of the table.
